• <u>Residency</u>

- Pensionado (proof of US\$600 monthly income)
- Golden Visa (Real Estate) Investment of US\$30,000

Health Care

- Basic care under the public system
- Excellent private system available
- Ease of Access
 - Direct flights to Panama, Mexico, United States, etc.
 - Domestic airlines reasonably priced
 - Local Transport Shuttles, buses, and taxis.

Country Cons

- It is a poor country...
- Except in tourist areas, English is not spoken much
- Like the states in 1950s, trash is an issue but getting better
- Mañana can mean in the morning, tomorrow, in two weeks or later
- Education levels are low which affects service and even comprehension in Spanish
- Managua has the best medical facilities, shopping, movie theaters, etc.

Granada Pros

- Authentic Spanish colonial architecture, city founded in 1524
- Situated on the largest fresh-water lake in Central America
- Very walkable
- Big enough to have modern supermarkets, some medical services
- 40 minutes to Managua and international airport
- 2 hours to most Pacific beach áreas
- Very popular with expats
- Surrounded by the delightful Pueblos Blancos

Granada Cons

- Less expensive than San Juan del Sur but higher than other areas
- Strongly dependent on tourism
- In the historic center, property is more expensive
- It is noisy with many religious festivals and events
- Can be quite warm

León Pros

- Spanish colonial homes, cheaper than Granada
- Home to many universities and museums
- 20 minutes to the beach
- Volcano surfing
- As large as Granada
- Beautiful cathedrals

León Cons

- Warmer, dryer than Granada
- Smaller expat community

San Juan Del Sur Pros

- On the Pacific beach, close to popular surfing beaches
- Most popular beach town on the Pacific coast
- Many restaurants, bars and hotels
- Younger expat community
- Close to Costa Rica border
- Salt water fishing

San Juan Del Sur Cons

- COL is a more expensive area of Nicaragua
- Very small town though many home developments nearby
- No major supermarkets and stores
- More than 2 hours to Managua and to international airport

Pacific Coast Pros

- Phenomenal beaches, many of which are empty
- Quaint fishing villages
- Protected turtle reserves
- Great deals on beach property
- Some first class resorts and larger developments

Pacific Coast Cons

- Some expensive developments
- Roads are somewhat rougher depending on location
- Unless in development, less infrastructure
- Further to major stores, medical facilities, and supplies

Managua Pros

- No real downtown center

- Few expats
- More industrial

- Good places to merge into the local culture


Mountain Areas Cons

- Very few expats
- Not much English spoken
- Few major stores



East Coast








East Coast Pros

- Beautiful untouched areas for the nomad
- Great fishing
- Cheaper properties though titles are more questionable
- Very low population
- Good for the rough country life
- As a former British colony, English is common



East Coast Cons

- Few medical services
- Fewer roads and infrastructure
- May have to travel by boat to some locations
- Few airports
- Not for the meek

Grading Nicaragua

- English Spoken Granada, San Juan del Sur English is more common but not in the rest of country except Bluefields
- Health Care Major cities have clinics and small hospitals. Only Managua has major hospitals and medical specialists
- **Climate** Tropical rather warm though much cooler in the higher elevations
- Infrastructure Major cities and developments have reliable electricity and Internet. Major roads are very good.

Grading Nicaragua

- **Safety** We consider Nicaragua to be very safe. An armed robbery would make headlines.
- **Culture** Rich culture and history. Major archeological finds are still common. Many, many festivals but usually religious based.
- Recreation Hiking, biking, swimming, diving, fishing, horseback riding, world-class surfing. Four golf courses, few tennis courts.
- **Taxes** While there is a 15% VAT on most goods and services, property taxes are usually less than \$100 annually.
- Schools A few international schools in Managua and Leon, the public schools are not adequate for most expats.
